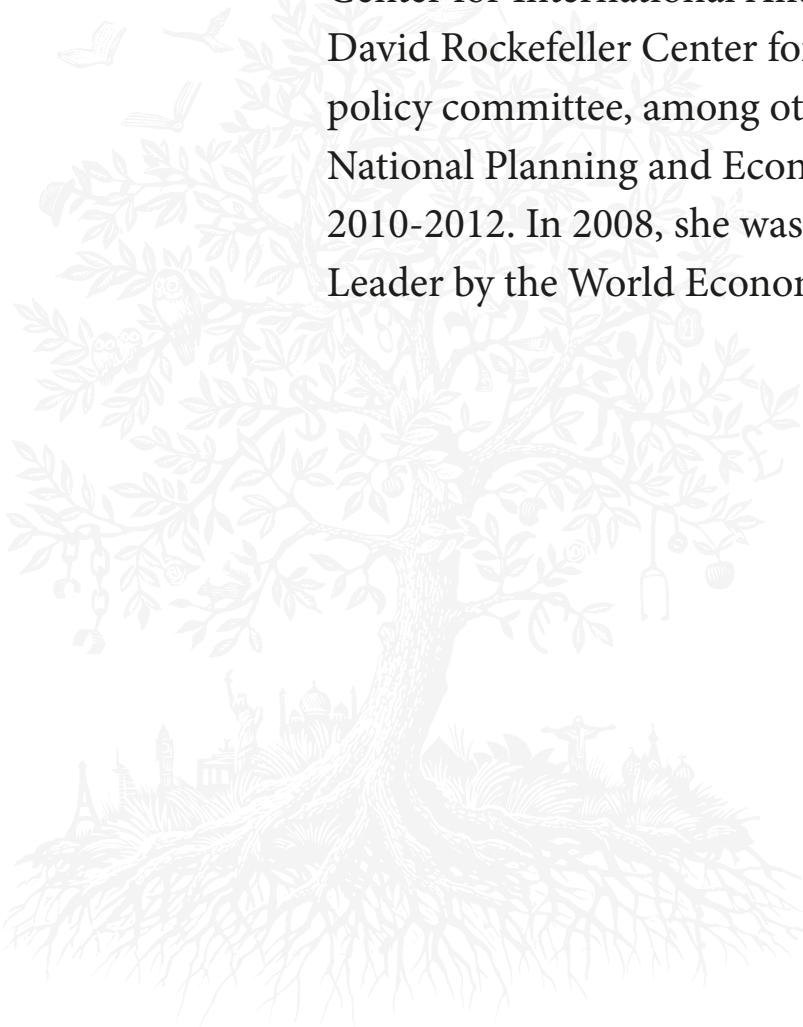




Laura Alfaro

She served as Minister of National Planning and Economic Policy in Costa Rica from 2010-2012. In 2008, she was honoured as a Young Global Leader by the World Economic Forum.

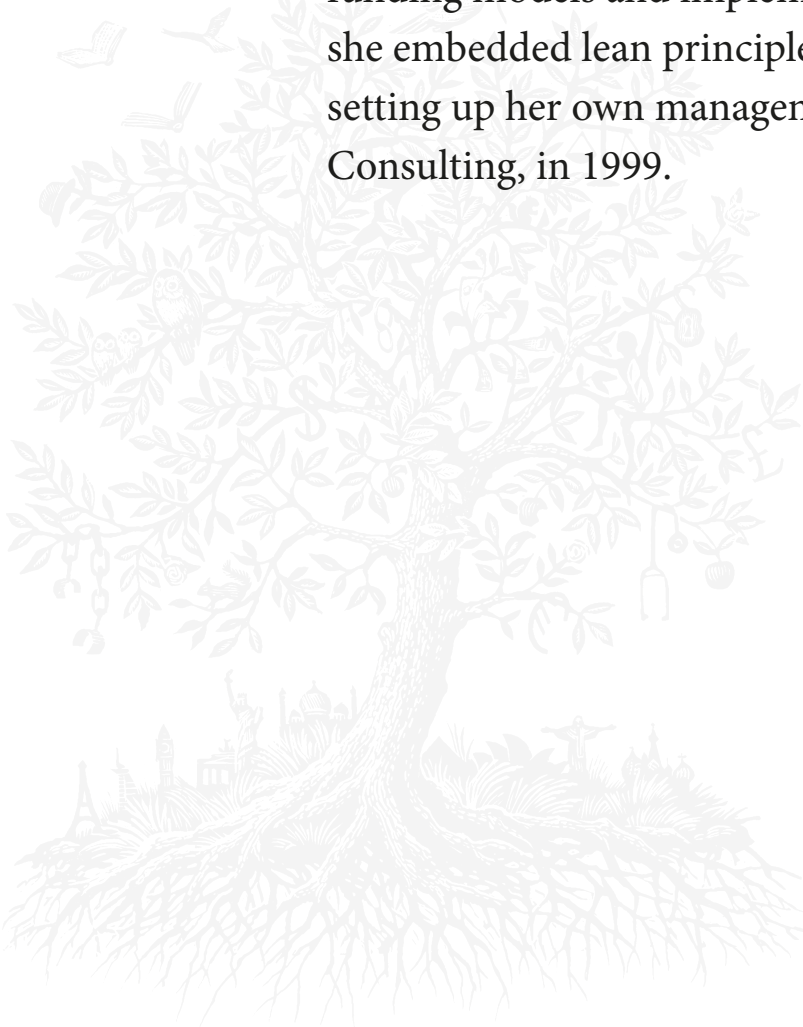




Pam Bateson

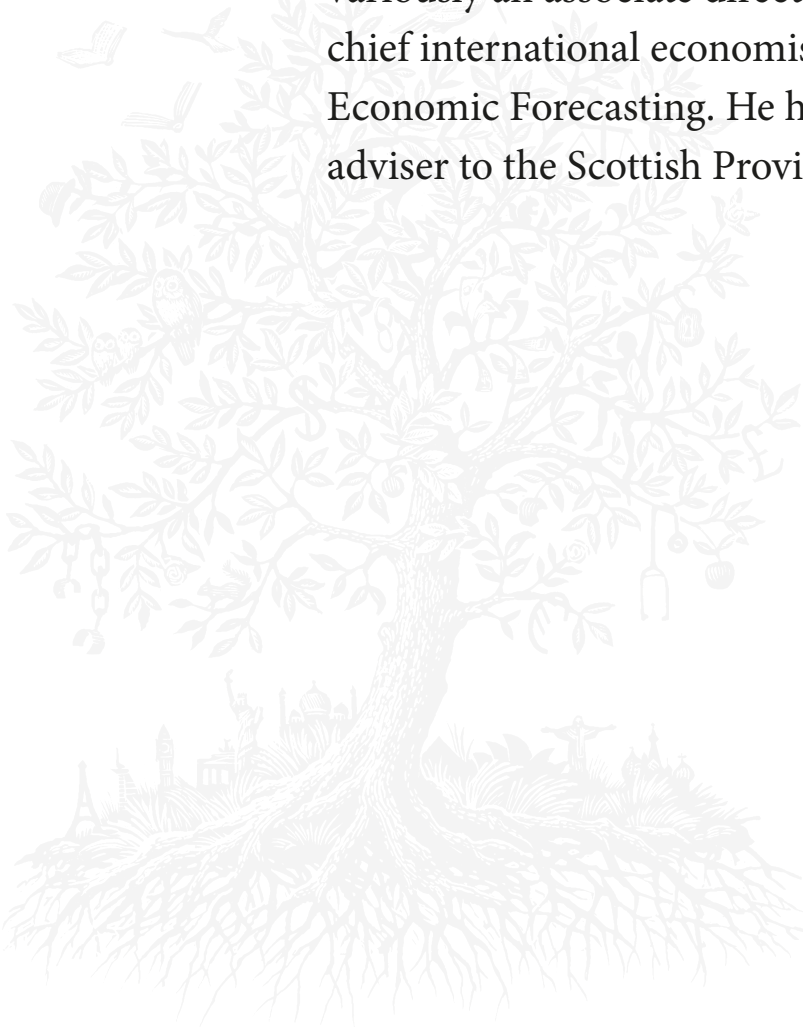




Graeme Leach

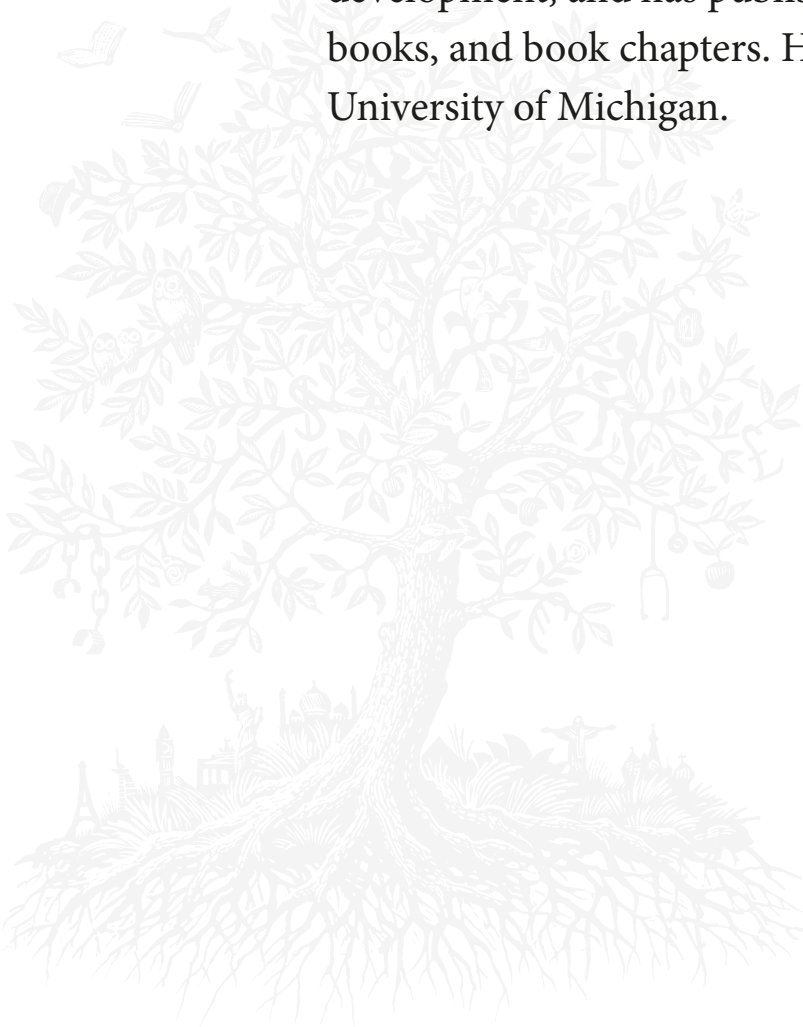




Mike Troilo
